

FROM THE RECTOR



At our March District meeting we had a great discussion about a model that comes from the College of Congregational Development called, "Faith Development in Community Model." I think this learning would be good for the parish to know. The model comes from the Year 2 materials, and is meant to help a parish think about all the many ways our church is used to develop one's faith.

The formal model is described in this way: "A congregation is a place that houses and shapes a dynamic movement between different stages of faith development. When healthy, a congregation both accepts people where they are and creates an environment in which people are invited into a more mature practice of their faith, respecting that their faith is legitimate and real."

"The role of congregational leaders is (a) to assess the current faith development of the individual and the congregational community; (b) to decide where to apply their efforts toward faith development, identifying ways to meet people where they are and to invite them to take the next step to go deeper; and (c) to nurture those who are mature practitioners, for their own sake and recognizing that they positively influence the whole."

"The model defines the different kinds of faith in the congregation as:

- **Vicariously Connected:** Those who do not come to your congregation but who somehow think of it as "theirs."
- **Occasional Attenders:** Those who attend the congregation a few times a year, often Christmas and Easter.
- **Sunday Sacramentalists:** Those who have some pattern of regularity at the Sunday Eucharist. For some this may mean once a month; for others, this may mean every Sunday. This group is mixed in terms of faith development, ranging from people who are tentative in their faith life to those who are actively pursuing going deeper in their spiritual life.
- **Mature Practitioners:** Those who are regular in their participation in the Sunday Eucharist and have developed a pattern of prayer and action that expresses a mature Christian faith."

What was wonderful was that during the conversation the facilitator had a great insight that we are meant to create "bridges" between each "circle of faith." These bridges help us help others find ways to connect at and between each level, both invite in and allow people to have the

space to explore and find their way towards the center.

Then we got into groups of four and shared some things our respective parishes do to create these bridges. Some examples I shared were: our Rummage Sale and creating postcards with both our Holy Week Schedule and a coupon for our Chick BBQ; Invite a Friend Sundays; HikYoga and Hula Hooping; exploring new ways to use social media and faith formation; just to name a few things we've been up to.

We are a congregation that "both accepts people where they are and creates an environment in which people are invited into a more mature practice of their faith." Our Small Groups are the bridges into our parish and towards a deep faith in the love God has for us all.

EPIPHANY CAFÉ NEWS

We were blessed to have Tom Ward who is a member of Gates Presbyterian Church. Tom presented a slide show sharing stories about his many trips to Guatemala. He spoke about the several mission trips to Guatemala he and others have made. His churches first mission trip to Panacal, Guatemala was in 1994, the Guatemala Partners Group (GPC) has worked to assist the people of that region in recovery from the four decades long civil war there. Through joint efforts with the residents there, funding has been provided to launch successful cattle and pig projects. Training of the women was provided by Qachuu Aloom on how to take care of their cows and pigs and they have been able to produce income from these animals while at the same time, building their own confidence and self esteem.

Tom told us some of the history of that region of the world and he also spoke about the plight of the Mayan people. His group has been helping the people of that region with:

Food Security – to help stop the malnutrition of the children and provide a reliable source of healthy food for families

Economic Security – to help provide a reliable source of income to the families through more job opportunities

Educational Security – to insure that deserving students have the opportunity to stay in school, attend college and to prepare themselves for work upon graduation

They also work with other organizations who help people of this region, I have included information on one of the groups. These groups are helping the people of Guatemala process seeds from native plants so that they will continue to be able to grow their own food in the future.

The Garden's Edge supports sustainable agriculture, micro-enterprise, and education in rural communities in order to revitalize cultural knowledge and improve economic well-being. I learned a great deal from Tom and found his presentation very interesting. Gates Presbyterian Church holds fundraisers from time to time to support this mission. I hope to provide more information on their future fund raising efforts. Thanks to Don Metzinger and Bob Renehan for organizing this event.


